



ART IN PUBLIC PLACES BOARD 1997 WORK PLAN

Introduction:

The Art in Public Places Board, now in its second year, will continue to advise City Council on projects and programs relating to public art.

Current Activity:

The APP Board currently has a list of 26 visual artists on the city's resource list for the middle tier of Design Consultants. These artists work with departments whose projects fall into the middle tier for APP. (Projects costing between \$50,000 and \$250,000) These consulting fees are paid by the city department.

The APP Board is currently working on five projects (over \$250,000):

- Stormwater's Fairbrooke Pond Project
- Stormwater's Mountain Avenue Storm Sewer Project
- Engineering's Sidewalk Art Project.
- Utility Service Center Expansion Project
- Front Range Community College Library

The APP Board is currently working on two art donation projects:

- Relief bronze memorial sculpture to be located at the Lincoln Center
- Hand-carved totem pole which is offered to the Senior Center

The APP Board's first permanent 1% project has been approved by City Council for the Pedestrian Bridge Railing on Drake Road. The project is currently in contract negotiations and under construction.

1997 Plan:

Implementing the goals and policies contained in the Art in Public Places Ordinance will be the primary focus for 1997. The following is a list of actions that will be implemented in 1997.

- Advise and make recommendations on changes to rules, regulations, guidelines, policy, administrative, and budgetary matters pertaining to the APP Program.
- Review and make recommendations to City Council on all 1997 APP Projects.
- Advise and make recommendations to City Council on all donations of art to the City.
- Education & Awareness Program for APP
 - A sub-committee will help inform the public and educate students regarding Art in Public Places.
- Create a maintenance schedule for city art collection.
- Work with artists and city departments on projects evaluations.
- Develop a plan for the location & inventory of art throughout the city.
